

How to get started

1. Talk to your GP

Ask if your regular GP is registered for the Antenatal Shared Care Program. If they are, they can refer you to a hospital antenatal clinic to start your shared care.

2. If your GP isn't registered

Call the South Western Sydney Antenatal Shared Care Liaison Midwife for help finding a registered GP near you.

There are close to 300 participating practices in the region.

3. Book your hospital appointment

Once you have a referral from your GP, contact the hospital antenatal clinic directly to book your first appointment. This should be by 14-weeks.

Antenatal shared care means your GP and the hospital work together to support you before and after your baby is born.

- You see your GP for most of your pregnancy check-ups.
- Midwives and doctors at the hospital care for you during the birth.
- After you leave hospital, your GP continues to support you and your baby.

Who is antenatal shared care for?

The program is for women with a low-risk pregnancy.

If any problems come up, your care will be transferred to a hospital specialist.

Why choose antenatal shared care?

See your usual GP

Your GP knows you and your medical history. This helps you feel comfortable and supported throughout your pregnancy.

Consistent care

You'll see the same GP before and after birth, so your care is continuous and coordinated.

Convenient appointments

GPs often offer appointments after-hours or on weekends - helping you fit care around work and family life.

Fewer hospital visits

You may need fewer trips to hospital. Your GP is usually closer to home and has shorter wait times.
